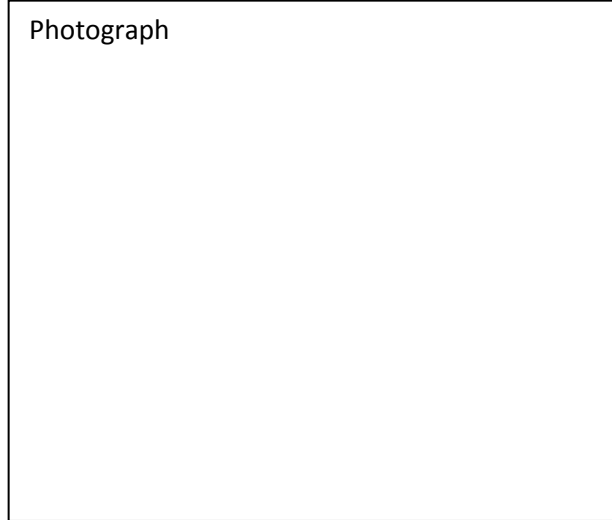

Information

Charles was the third child of seven, born in Bugbrooke to Charles and Catherine Eales. In 1911, Charles was living and working in Northampton as an assistant dairyman.

Living at 19 Harley Street, Coventry with his parents and working as a milkman at the start of the war. Enlisted 9th October 1916 in the 7th Battalion of the Northamptonshire Regiment, as Pte 7089. His medical showed him to be 5ft 4ins, with a 37 inch chest. Served in France from the 1st January 1917 to the 11th April 1917. He took a gunshot wound in the right shoulder on the 11th April.

He was clearly not considered fit for military service, and served the remainder of the war in the agricultural company of the Labour Corps. in Northampton, as Pte 546153.

Died from Influenza and Pneumonia at home on the 7th November 1918, and is buried in the Towcester Rd. Cemetery in Northampton. He served in the UK during the war and received the Victory Medal.

His brother Frederick also served in the Great War and was also killed. On transfer to the Labour Corps, his papers also state he had the following brothers also serving – W Eales, John Eales, and George Eales.
