Information from National Roll of the Great War

BASS, A. S. J., Private, Machine Gun Corps,

He volunteered in March 1915 and was retained at various home stations before being drafted to France in February 1918. Whilst overseas he took part in the Retreat and Advance of the Allies, and, after the cessation of hostilities, proceeded to Germany with the Army of Occupation. He served on the Rhine, but, contracting Influenza, unfortunately died through the effects in February 1919, and was entitled to the General Service and Victory Medals.

Additional Information

One of eight children, Arthur was the son of Benjamin and Joanna Bass. Benjamin had moved to Bugbrooke from Langar in Nottinghamshire and worked as a labourer for the Army Ordnance.

Arthur was a farm labourer in 1911 before he enlisted in the army in the March of 1915.

He was a private in the Machine Gun Corps – Cavalry, 2nd Squadron. Regimental number 101479. He was awarded the British Service Medal and the Victory Medal. In the record of his personal effects, he was listed as dying in France on the 4th January 1919.

His memorial is in the Cologne Southern Cemetery
