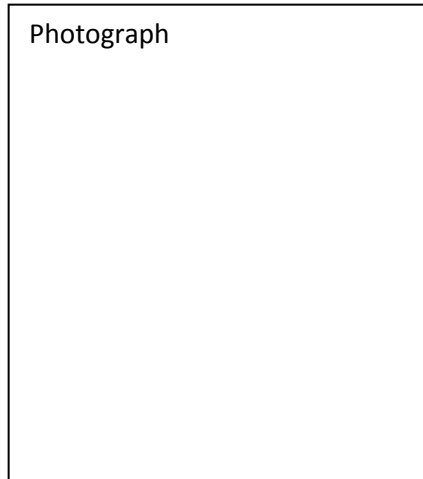

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Cephas LANGLEY was one of seven surviving children (of ten) of George LANGLEY, a platelayer on the railway, and his wife Jane.

He enlisted/was conscripted into the Royal Garrison Artillery (RGA) as a private soldier (Gunner in the RGA), numbered 93301. He is assumed to have served in France after January 1916, where he qualified for the British War Medal and the Victory Medal. [His Medal Index Card records his name as 'Cehpas']

He had a son, Walter John LANGLEY, born in 1922, who died in 2005.

Cephas died in December 1922 aged just 37; his widow Shirley lived-on until June 1977.
