He volunteered in October 1914, and was retained for a time on transport duties with the Royal Army Service Corps. In May 1917 he was transferred to the 14th Royal Irish Rifles and drafted to France, where he took part in much fighting in the Ypres sector, and was badly wounded. As a result he was invalided home and eventually discharged medically unfit in August 1918. He holds the General Service and Victory Medals.

*Additional Information*

Rifleman George William Bass was the son of Benjamin and Joanna Bass and born in Bugbrooke in 1898. Before the war he was a farm labourer. He was one of four brothers who enlisted. His service is shown in the entry of the National roll above.

The records show that he received the Silver War Badge following his discharge due to wounds on the 15<sup>th</sup> August 1918.

Of the four brothers only George and Charles returned.
