<i>Additional Information</i>

Harry EALES was the survivor of two children of Alfred EALES, a labourer living in Great Lane, Bugbrooke, and his wife Mary.

Harry had enlisted by early 1915 in the Royal Engineers (RE) as a private soldier (Sapper number 68650) and went to France on 1 May 1915. He was later re-numbered WR251425, the 'WR' prefix denoting employment on 'Waterways & Railways' duties. He survived the war and qualified for the 1914-15 Star, the British War Medal and the Victory Medal.

He died in December 1974 in Daventry.
