CLARKE, M. W., Private, 1st Northants. Regt.

Mobilised at the outbreak of war he was at once sent to France, where he fought in the Retreat from Mons, and at the Battles of the Marne, the Aisne, Ypres, Aubers Ridge, Festubert, Loos, and Albert. He was unfortunately killed in action on the Somme on July 19th 1916, and was entitled to the Mons Star, and the General Service and Victory Medals.



The 6th child of 7, Mark lived with his parents in Big Lane(Great Lane). His father was a shepherd in 1891, and both parents together with all children were born in Bugbrooke. 10 years later, his father was a gardener, and Mark at 13 was an agricultural labourer.

Both Mark and his younger brother Walter were soldiers in 1911, and clearly joined up at the same time as the closeness of their service numbers testify. They served together in the 1st Battalion of the Northants Regiment, and both were killed.
