Shortly after volunteering in September 1914, he was drafted to the Western Front, where he saw severe fighting in various sectors. After taking part in the Battles of Loos, the Somme, Arras, Ypres and Cambrai, he was invalided home in 1918 suffering from frost-bite, and was for a considerable period in hospital. He was demobilised in February 1919, holding the 1914-15 Star, and the General Service and Victory Medals

In 1911 Philip was living at home with his parents in Bugbrooke working as a brick layer.

At the start of the war he was 29 years old and enlisted in September. With Service Number 21325, he joined the Royal Field Artillery and was at Swanage Camp before departing for France the following year.
