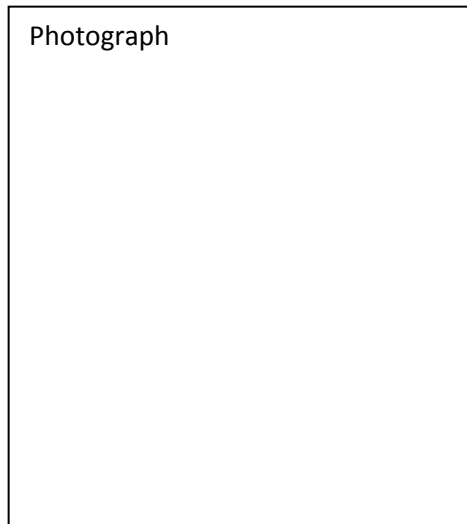

Additional Information

Leonard was the second son of Joseph BANNARD, a blacksmith.

He enlisted into the Northamptonshire Regiment on 27 January 1915 as a volunteer for the 7th Battalion (known as 'Mobbs Own'), and as Private 17139, he was posted to 'B' Company, with which he apparently served throughout the war.

He went to France on 31 August 1915, returning to England for early discharge due to sickness, on 11 February 1919, receiving the Silver War Badge (numbered B202717). He also qualified for the 1914-15 Star, the British War Medal and the Victory Medal.

He married locally in 1927 and died in December 1968 at Brixworth.
