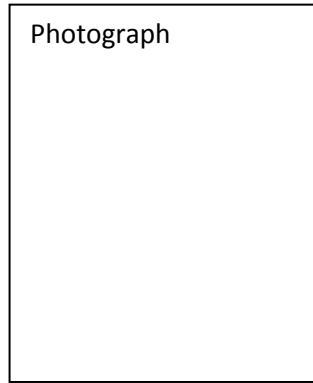

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| <i>Additional Information</i> |
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Herbert Henry MOORE was born in Bugbrooke, one of five surviving children of Griffith MOORE, a coachman, and his mother Ellen. His mother died in late 1910 and by early 1915 he was living with his widowed father in Boston, Lincolnshire, working as a butcher.

Herbert attested at Lincoln on 17 November 1915 for the Royal Garrison Artillery (RGA) as a Gunner (private soldier). He was allocated number 80845 and placed on the Reserve (at home) from the following day, being mobilised eventually on 15 May 1916.

He reported to No. 4 Depot, RGA, at Great Yarmouth on 16 May for basic training, being moved on from 7 June and then embarking for France on 26 August, joining a Base Depot at first. He served with No. 9 Siege Battery from 22 March 1917, then at a Base Depot from 7 February 1918. He was with No. 267 Siege Battery in Germany from 26 July 1919, returning to England on 7 September that year to take his discharge to the Reserve on 11 October, travelling to Bugbrooke.

He earned the British War Medal and the Victory Medal, receipt of which he acknowledged from Lowestoft in September 1921.

Herbert died in March 1971 at Great Yarmouth, and his widow, variously Fossbrooke/Fosbrooke/Fossbrook in official records, died in September 1982, at Waveney in Suffolk.
